New England Wood Carvers Highest Award

The NEWC MEMBER OF THE YEAR AWARD is given to an active dues-paying member who has made an outstanding contribution to the organization during the current year and past year. Accomplishments made beyond the club's usual meeting place are acceptable providing they satisfy the intent of the guidelines. The award has been presented since 1976 to individuals who have exemplified club services and leadership, NEWC members of record shall cast their vote in the month of April for one of the nominees eligible to receive this award.

NEWC MEMBER OF THE YEAR AWARD GUIDELINES for NOMINATION

To be considered for this prestigious award the nominee will have made contributions like the examples given in these guidelines. The nominee's contributions should be substantial and recognized by several people. The examples do not necessarily include everything that a member could have done. They serve as a pathway in helping the nominator to consider carefully all the possible accomplishments this nominee has made that makes him or her worthy of this award. Moreover, it is advisable to speak with people who are closest to the nominee. This step will ensure that all the known credit has been gathered in preparation to completing the nomination form.

- 1.Inspired people to take up wood carving, helped people to improve their woodcarving skills, recruited people to become members of NEWC, or reached out to the community in a manner that promoted the art of carving.
- 2. Taught woodcarving in different settings, tutored one or more individuals, demonstrated carving methods in use today, or made presentations of carvings in a variety of settings before an audience.
- 3. Exhibited personal works of accomplishments, entered carvings in competition, contributed to various publications. Or was/is an active carving instructor.
- 4. Is now or may have been an officer of the club, directed a club project, worked in some capacity in the Spirit of Wood Show, or took charge of one or more membership meeting activities.



I started carving in 1986, that is so long ago I don't remember what motivated me to try carving. Ever since I was a kid I always liked working with wood. Eventually I was able to have a wood working shop in our home where I built furniture for the house, my daughters and grand kids. So I guess interest in wood working led me to carving.

My wife Elaine is an accomplishment tole and decorative artist. Elaine wanted to attend a Rosemaling class at Vesterheim in Decorah lowa and of course wanted to be driven out by her live in chauffeur – me. She learned Harley Rafsal was teaching a caricature carving class at Vesterheim at the same time, as the saying goes the rest is history. I carved the gnome shown here at that class - my first carving.

When I returned home I found Russ Coburn's bird carving in Lunenburg, MA so I became a bird carver. The nuthatch shown was my first bird. As I was getting ready for class one night I told Elaine I was going to burn my bird at class. Her response was "oh don't do that it's not that bad"! My last bird was a full size loon with two babies made for my daughter, the babies represent her two children. The loon took me about three years to complete, although I was happy with it, I was burnt out on birds. I entered the loon in the last Wild Life Carving competition in Connecticut and to my great delight won best of life size waterfowl.

I carve a Santa every year for my wife and daughters, my first one shown here was carved in 1987. The other Santa shown was donated to The PLUS Co., a nonprofit I work with. The PLUS Co. has a silent auction dinner dance each year, my Santa is sold in a live auction. The one shown

went for \$800, they have gone for as much as \$1500. I am delighted The PLUS Co. receives such high donations which support their good work.

I have a small carving group that meets at my house Friday mornings from 9 till noon. In 2017 we asked Edsel Johnson if he would conduct a class with us to carve Floyd Rhadigan's Dog Face soldier, my version is shown here.

I enjoy knife and gouge carving but do use power a little as needed to clean up some difficult spots. I paint my pieces in acrylics and seal the final piece with Krylon 1311 which protects the finish for many years.

I like to challenge myself in doing more complicated pieces, I think that has helped improve my carvings over the years, it also increases my frustration level some time. I have taken classes from many instructors over the years, I particularly enjoyed attending CCA Carve Along events and was sad to see them discontinued in the northeast. I have also enjoyed the Rhode Island Carve Along events for several years and look forward to the revised event in 2018.

My advice to new carvers is to keep challenging yourself and finish each piece you start, don't throw something away because you are not pleased with it. Every piece is part of your carving journey and will serve to show you how you are progressing in your carving adventure.
